The Janeway - Caring for Children of Newfoundland Labrador for 50 Years

Celebrating the 50th anniversary of the Janeway provided its staff, past and present, and the general population, with the opportunity to reminisce on the significant role the Hospital plays in pediatric care in Newfoundland and Labrador. The Janeway Hospital opened in August of 1966, where it remained at its Pleasantville location until 2001, when Eastern Health opened a new, state-of-the-art Hospital as part of the Health Sciences Complex.



To mark the Janeway Children's Health and Rehabilitation Centre's 50th year in service, Eastern Health, with support from the Janeway Children's Hospital Foundation, planned a series of initiatives throughout 2016. A new special care unit is coming to the Janeway

Plans for a new special care unit at the Janeway are moving forward through the support of the Janeway Foundation and its donors with an \$800,000 contribution.

Currently, infants up to 3 months old who require surgery are admitted in Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) with the neonates (infants less than four weeks old). However, with the increase in neonates, there is a risk of infection if babies, who have gone home, are re-admitted and put back in NICU with these small, vulnerable neonates.

"At the moment, only NICU has the capability to provide specialized care. In order to provide the optimal set-up for both the neonates and the surgical infants from 1-3 months, we need the same set up on J4 Surgery," stated Karen Rice, Division Manager of Janeway Inpatient Services. "Also, the room may also help prevent diversion. In 2010, mothers and babes had to be diverted outside the province because there was no space to accommodate them," she continued.

Surgical babies being admitted still need all the specialized care of any small infant. A new special care room on J4 Surgery will serve two significant purposes; it will help reduce the number of infants in NICU and it will be a tool to help prevent diversion.

The special care unit will provide:

- a specialized area in which to house them;
- nursing personnel educated in the specialized care of these infants; and
- special equipment including OHIO beds, isolettes, monitors, and syringe pumps.

"The Janeway Foundation works alongside the Janeway's medical staff to ensure they

have the best in leading-edge technology helping to result in more positive outcomes for our young patients," said Lynn Sparkes, Executive Director, Janeway Foundation.



Janeway Foundation gives funding to Pediatric Research Unit

This past summer, the Janeway Children's Hospital Foundation presented \$150,000 to fund pediatric research in Newfoundland and Labrador.

"The Janeway, in affiliation with Memorial University, serves as a primary clinical resource for vital pediatric medical research," said Lynn Sparkes, Janeway Foundation. "With our commitment to help fund such research, the Janeway Pediatric Research Unit will serve the needs of children throughout the province. Incorporating this research into clinical practices enhances and expands programs by facilitating pediatric clinic trials, clinical studies, and health services initiatives."

This donation will fund research in areas including:

- high-risk births
- childhood obesity
- genetics
- infant feeding
- mental health

One such study is looking at ways to improve the well-being of young people living with type 1 diabetes. "Newfoundland and Labrador has some of the highest reported rates of type 1 diabetes in the world," stated Dr. Roger Chafe, Director, Janeway Pediatric Research Unit. "Currently, there are approximately 1,000 people in the province with the disease; roughly half are under the age of 18." Dr. Chafe continued, "Without additional funding for ongoing medical pediatric research, advancements in the diagnosis and treatment of illness and injury would not be possible."

"Thanks to the support of our donors and partners, such critical research has the potential to have long-term, positive impact on our children and their families," added Ms. Sparkes.

What's new? WiFi is up and running at the Janeway

"For our doctors, nurse and administrators, it improves our ability to communicate instantly. For instance, we can bring tablets to the bedside to explain medical procedures to patients and parents using pictures and digital images," Dr. Kevin Chan, Clinical Chief Pediatrics, stated.

Providing WiFi throughout the Janeway is not a luxury or a "nice to have." It is another essential tool in improving the patient care experience at our facility.

MRI upgrade is a welcome improvement to ten-year old system

A Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) system plays a critical role in the diagnostic imaging capabilities of any hospital. The Janeway's MRI was purchased in 2005 and so required upgrading to make it more compatible with current technology. Rather than replacing the current system, it was determined upgrading was a viable option that would result in improved speed and image quality. This vital MRI upgrade enables the Janeway to deliver better diagnoses, patient care and most importantly, better medical

outcomes for patients. The tiniest of babies who go through the upgraded MRI can get lifesaving diagnoses months earlier than was previously possible. Such was the case with Leah Brown, the 6-month old daughter of Robyn and Stephen Brown of Lewisporte, one of the first to be diagnosed using the MRI upgrade. The equipment delivered greater speed and improved image quality – and ultimately – a better medical outcome for the young patient and her grateful family.

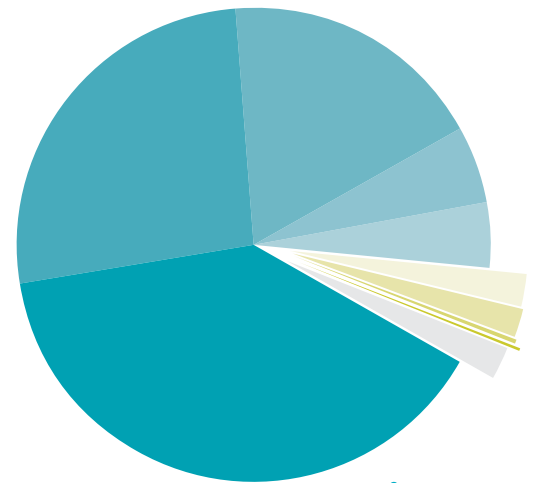
Mary Brown's Owner and CEO, Greg Roberts, presented a significant donation of \$450,000 towards the \$800,000 cost of the upgrade.
