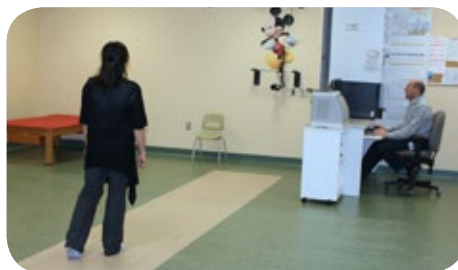
Motion Analysis Centre

The Motion Analysis Centre (MAC) at the Janeway is the only "gait lab" located east of Montreal that is used in a clinical setting. This technology enables computer-controlled and infrared video cameras to record how a person walks, or their "gait". This past year, two additional force plates were built into the floor to help improve the study of patients' balance and gait.

When a patient visits the lab for testing, reflective markers are placed on their legs.

These markers are tracked by the cameras and provide computer-based graphics and animation showing how the legs move while walking.

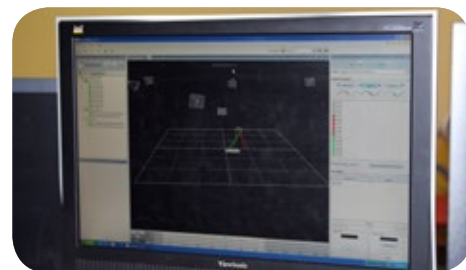
Another test includes special sensors [electromyography] placed on the legs, above the muscles. These sensors measure the activity of the leg muscles to show if these



muscles are working as they should while the person walks.

The physicians and therapists use the information collected to diagnose conditions and plan follow-up treatment.

Latest Innovations in Pediatric Surgery - Integrated Operating Rooms

Integrated Operating Rooms (OR's) are the new standard for modern hospitals. For specialized surgeries that take place in the older OR's, equipment must be carted and

brought in for each surgery. Medical staff then test the equipment to ensure it is ready for use. The integrated OR's configuration eliminates this process and provides increased efficiency.

The advantages for our surgical team include:

- easier access to patient data and more comprehensive information from linked technology;
- ceiling and wall-mounted endoscopic

video equipment and other technology to replace the awkward and space-filling cart-mounted equipment;

- the room set-up will allow physicians and nurses to have greater mobility in the immediate operating area, will reduce the length of some surgeries, will aid in maintaining the sterile field, and will facilitate the integration of multiple OR technologies and video signals.

Members of the Newfoundland and Labrador Building and Construction Trades Council generously donated \$1.75 million to build three new integrated operating rooms at the Janeway Hospital. Thank you NLBCTC for caring and supporting the children of our province.

Introduction of a Mental Health and Addictions Walk-in Clinic

In March, Eastern Health introduced "DoorWays," a mental health and addictions walk-in service, at several sites throughout the region. Health-care professionals, including psychologists, nurses, addictions counselors and social workers will offer single-session therapy services on a first-come, first-serve basis to those who feel they need to speak to someone right away.

These walk-in clinics for patients 12 years and older are available in Clarenville, Ferryland, Harbour Grace, Holyrood, Whitbourne, Marystown, and St. John's.

With a single-session walk-in clinic service, there is no triage, no intake process, and no wait list. There is no formal assessment or formal diagnostic process, just one hour of therapy focused on the clients' stated needs. (Source: Eastern Health)
